

### COMPARISON OF IF SCORES


## Total moderated score for each IF studied


## COMPARISON OF IF SCORES WITH SIMILAR STAFF NUMBERS

# COMPARISON OF IF SCORES WITH REVENUE ON A SIMILAR SCALE




Total moderated score for each IF with 4m-8m CHF annual revenue

### **TOP 10s ANALYSIS - World Rowing**

Explanation of Top 10s: As part of the analysis for the Fifth Review of IF Governance, the 10 best-performing IFs were identified for each indicator, where it proved possible to do so. Top 10s were selected for 40 of the 60 indicators. For the other 20 indicators it was not practical to choose between IFs as many of them tended to cover the specific topic well in a similar way.

The selection of Top 10s was an innovation first introduced for the Fourth Review and is more subjective than the scoring of indicators. For this reason, performance in the Top 10s list was <u>not</u> taken into account in the overall score or group.

## SELECTED POINTS FROM THE ANALYSIS

#### <u>Overall</u>

- World Rowing is close to the top of group A2
- The moderated score of 203 is 7 lower than the self-assessed score, compared to an average mark-down of 15 across all IFs
- Considering just the 50 indicators retained (with some amendments) from 2021-22, the score rose considerably from 149 to 171, compared to an average increase of 10
- The score on the 10 new indicators was 32 (out of 40), compared to an average of 26
- Note that the assessment is based on measures which were already in place by early March 2024. Credit has not been given for reforms or activity to be implemented or proposed at a later date. This is consistent with the approach adopted for other IFs and previous assessments.
- World Rowing achieved Top 10s in 16 out of 40 indicators assessed in this way

#### **Positive**

- World Rowing was the highest-scoring among nine IFs with 10-19 staff and eight IFs with annual revenue from 4m to 8m CHF
- World Rowing scored well all-round, particularly in the Transparency section
- New work since 2021-22 includes the introduction of an athlete representative on the Executive Committee, commitment to the UN Sport for Climate Action framework with associated monitoring of emissions, and proactive training on anti-discrimination
- World Rowing performed well on the 10 new indicators for 2023-24; for example, the rights and responsibilities of athletes are consistent with the IOC Declaration and set out clearly, and there is extensive activity in the area of gender equality

#### Areas for improvement

• A small number of indicators with a score of 2 would merit attention, although not all will be immediate priorities
